Course unit objective: The aim of the course is to familiarize students with the basic legal concepts and institutes of competition law, i.e. in presenting EU competition rules and their implementation in the national legislations of member states and third countries on the path to EU membership. By comparatively legal representation of national legislation and solutions in the area of competition law and consumer protection, harmonized competition rules are set out. By demonstrating the rights of competition of the EU and the sources of competition law in domestic legislation, students are introduced to the basic principles of competition law, and in particular with the harmful consequences of the cartel and the types of agreements that restrict competition.			
Learning outcomes of Course unit The outcome of the course is to train students to identify and define competition law institutions and to apply them as relevant to solving a specific problem in practice.
