Course unit objective Helping students get familiar with the basic legal concepts of Criminal Procedure Law in international context. Students should be educated to make connection between legal norms of the criminal procedure and the practical problems. The main goal is to educate students how to solve practical cases applying the legal norms of criminal procedure law.			
Learning outcomes of Course unit By the end of the course of the criminal procedure law, students will be expected to know legal requirements for the conducting the process against the offenders. Students should be able to understand and interpret the facts from criminal procedure law upon previously obtained knowledge. A student should be capable of solving daily problems in functioning of the criminal procedure mechanism.			
Course unit contents <i>Theoretical classes</i> Those classes should offer explanations for the all basic legal concepts in contemporary national and international criminal procedure law. These concepts include legal norms involving: fundamentals of criminal procedure law, organization of the courts, competence, criminal procedure from the initial phases, criminal charge, trial, legal remedies. The space for seminar papers will be provided during the classes. <i>Practical classes</i> With the help of professor students should get familiar with the examples of national and international case-law and main judgments concerning criminal procedure law issues. Students should also learn how to write certain legal documents from the area of this part of law. Comparative criminal procedure law thinking will be also encouraged. Within the practical classes there will be two tests where the students could check their current level of knowledge.
