The goal of the course is in- depth study of the subject of International Public Law. Students are introduced with relevant sources of this branch of law, distinctive traits of those sources, hierarchy among them and their application in practice. The aim is achieved using the analysis of the most significant case law of the International Court of Justice. The analysis covers different international contracts, customs and general legal principles referring to their importance and nature. Special attention is given to the doctrine and judicial practices in disputes settlements. The course is also addressing subjects of international law, rights, duties and responsibilities of the State, succession, recognition of the State and recognition of the government.			
The outcome of the course is achievement of required level of knowledge and skills that enables attendee to develop critical thinking about wide range of questions from the area of the Public International Law and to independently conduct original research using appropriate literature and correct methodology..			
The content of the subject covers in-depth study the following questions – Concept of the Public International Law; Origin and development of the Public International Law; Doctrine of the Public International Law; Relationship between national and Public International Law; Formal sources of the Public International Law; Subjects of the Public International Law; State; Recognition of the State and recognition of Government; Fundamental rights and obligations of the State; States jurisdiction in the international law; Responsibility of the State; Succession; Institutions competent for international relations; Multilateral diplomacy; State boundaries and international law; State territory; International Leases and Servitudes; International rivers; Maritime area; Air space; Polar regions; Cosmic (Outer) space; Law governing international contracts; International organizations; United Nations; Regional organizations; Specialized agencies; International human rights; International Criminal Law; Peaceful disputes settlement; Armed conflict under international law.
